



First Parish Building Improvements

First Parish of Milton is excited to announce the completion of several building accessibility improvements. With the words "Universal Design" in mind, the concept of designing to meet the needs of all users, we continue to build on efforts to create an environment open to all.

Our new person lift, installed between the Meeting House and what's affectionately known as the Link (our inside passage to the Parish Hall, meeting spaces and administrative offices), greeted our members, guests and friends returning from summer break. The steps down to the Link have long been recognized as a significant impediment to anyone with mobility limitations (including wheelchair and walker users, and arthritis sufferers). During the winter, it is a hardship to our friends who must go outside to move between

the Meeting House and the other church rooms and facilities.

The church governing board, Buildings and Grounds Committee and an accessibility task force reviewed several options and realized space constraints limited our choices. The final choice was a simple motorized lift (manufactured by Savaria Concord Lifts) that will silently whisk riders up and down the vertical span of 25 inches parallel to the existing stairs.

While much of our building interior is easily navigated, these few steps demonstrate how quickly those of us who are less agile than Fred Astaire can be stopped cold in public spaces.

Bathrooms are another common example where a modern makeover can make a big difference. Our architect overcame any sense of claustrophobia our bathrooms once provoked, to get a look from the inside. He didn't run away screaming (yes we keep them clean, it's just that they are so darn small), so we knew there was hope.

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REFLECTIONS FROM THE MINISTER PARISA PARSA



We all have rough times now and then. Coping with illness, loss, life changes, relationship struggles... just getting through life requires support sometimes. Church communities are natural centers of support in difficult times, and this one is no exception. This month in worship we will be exploring the different ways we find and experience healing, and highlighting some of the ways we help one another here at First Parish. Exactly how to enlist the support you need, however, can be mystifying to some and so I'd like to take this space this month to clarify some of the resources available in our community and how to access them.

Pastoral care is the term used for the act of providing spiritual nurture and support to members of a church. In our case, the minister is primarily responsible for overseeing supportive services to members. That means that I am the primary point of contact for coordinating the different ways we reach out to one another. But I am by no means the only point of contact.

Our Caring Circle is a compassionate and effective group of members who provide meals, cards, rides, and other forms of concrete support to those in need. As you'll witness later this month, most of us in this community have benefited from their care. There is nothing like the well-timed arrival of a meal at your door to let you know that you are loved. The Caring Circle embodies that love every week in many, many ways.

Sometimes the need for support is a little more than a meal to show concern; we need to have a conversation with someone, help with sorting something out, or advice about what resources we might use to work through a difficult time. This is when

people usually call the minister. I welcome calls of this kind, and am always honored to be trusted with your concerns. The standard for parish ministers offering this kind of counseling support is to see folks three times for any single issue. Any more than that and we are in danger of venturing into the territory that a licensed therapist or counselor might better navigate, and so at that point a referral is usually made. On a practical level, it's important that we be

able to offer the same level of support for everyone in the congregation. Just a few people getting counseling support on a regular basis can fill the calendar to overflowing.

There are some cases in which we know a difficult time that is likely to last a while, and it is helpful to have someone in the congregation who can be a central point of contact and regular check-in as the situation goes through ups and downs. It's common when a congregation has reached the size ours has for there to be a team of lay people trained to assist with this ministry of listening and companionship. Last year, ministerial intern John Wright drew together and trained a group of four

members who were interested in offering just such a ministry: Tasha Bello, Tat McCorry, Denise Strang, and Libby Wasilewski. These lay ministers meet monthly with me and, with permission of members who have come to me seeking support, are being paired with folks in need to be a friendly visitor, a regular touchpoint, or an advocate through a difficult time.

I am the central coordinator of pastoral care, and work closely with the lay ministers and the Caring Circle (who also will work together) to make sure that we're offering the congregation the best support possible. It's good to remember, though, that as with any place in life, the only way that we can know of a need or concern is if it's communicated directly. *We rely on members to communicate their needs or concerns as they arise.*

There are countless ways that we offer hope and healing to one another in this community. These formal resources are just the surface of what we hope are ever-deepening ways of being in relationship, strengthening one another for the journey of life and learning together as we go just what it is that heals us, what it is that makes us whole.

When you are struggling with a personal issue or loss that you would like to talk over

When you are concerned about some aspect of congregational life

When you are feeling depressed or troubled

When you are considering joining the church

When you have a good story to share

When you have an important decision or life choice to make

When you want to plan a ritual: a child dedication, wedding, memorial, funeral, house blessing

When you or someone in the congregation is arrested, in jail, in need of support

When you want to explore your spiritual path

When you feel challenged to bear witness to our faith in the wider world

When you want to discuss an issue or topic you heard about in Sunday morning worship

When you would just like someone to talk to

When you have won the lottery

When you want to add something to the Sunday morning prayers, and won't be here to write it

And, if you can't decide whether to call the minister or not, CALL ME!

New restrooms, the person lift, slate repairs and new copper gutters on the Meetinghouse are only the beginning. The B&G committee is excited about the promise of meeting our matching grant goals and the continued improvements that will follow.

Some of the work on the horizon includes accessibility and worship space

renovations to the Meetinghouse, repairs to the parish hall roof and gutter system, carpet and runner replacement in most common areas of the campus, some exterior carpentry and lots of painting.

Through their efforts, our second improvement resulted in completely redesigned and accessible bathrooms. Putting meaning into the words "user friendly", our cramped bathrooms have been transformed into modern usable restrooms.

Bill Macmillan, First Parish Operations Manger providing oversight for the improvements, had this to say: "First Parish is committed to preserving the beauty and history of all the buildings on our campus. We are thrilled to have addressed contemporary issues of access and modern usage requirements, all while making it look like the improvements have always been here". Recent efforts range from refurbishing the access ramp into our Meeting-

house, the addition of three marked handicapped parking spaces, installing an open wireless computer network, new phone systems, exterior restoration of the historic Children's Church and structural repairs to the carriage house.

The Reverend Parisa Parsa sees this as important work in maintaining a welcoming environment.

"Our first religious principle affirms the worth and dignity of every person, and it is important that we reflect that principle not just in our words and treatment of one another person-to-person, but also and especially in the physical environment we create. Our journey is not finished, and we look forward to completing

a second phase to make the interior of our worship space more accessible next summer."

Upcoming plans include work on the Parish Hall and Kitchen floors, and a major initiative to move toward becoming a "green sanctuary" through waste reduction and energy conservation.

Dear First Parish in Milton Members and Friends,

Would you please join the Pitcher Family Descendants in a short dedication ceremony of a plaque honoring the memory of Andrew and Margaret Pitcher, two of the earliest settlers in Milton, MA, with a short reception afterwards at The First Parish in Milton Parish Hall following the dedication of the plaque?

Members of the Pitcher Family, who are descendants of Andrew Pitcher and Margaret Russell, will meet on Saturday, October 6, 2007 at 10:00 a.m. at the First Parish Church in Milton, Massachusetts which is located at the corner of Canton Avenue and Thatcher Street for the dedication of a bronze plaque commemorating the memory of the original home site of Andrew and Margaret Pitcher who settled there in 1650. The dedication will take place at 10:30 followed by a short reception in The First Parish Parish Hall.

The First Parish in Milton, owners of the property, have given permission for the erection of the plaque on the property. The plaque is to be mounted on a small stone cut to receive the plaque and the plaque is secured to the stone with pins and rosettes. The First Parish Church has approved of the site of the plaque and they have graciously given us the use of the Parish Hall for a small reception for family members and honored guests after the presentation. The reception will include simple punch, coffee, and cookies followed by a warm get together for the participants and guests to meet and greet.

Andrew and Margaret Pitcher are amongst the earliest pioneer settlers of the area, which became Milton, MA in 1662. Andrew was a Cordwainer and his wife Margaret served as a Midwife. Andrew Pitcher's name appears as a grantee of land in Dorchester in 1634, so he did arrive in this country prior to that date. About 1634, Andrew Pitcher and five others settled in the section of Dorchester, which later separated from that parent town and was to be incorporated as the Town of Milton in 1662. In 1641 Andrew Pitcher was declared a "freeman" and a proprietor. Andrew Pitcher also signed a document supporting free public schools; making it an effective movement in Massachusetts. Andrew Pitcher held 122 acres of land and his home stood on what is now Canton Avenue near the corner of Thatcher Street. His property reached the Neponset River. By 1801 the acreage had been reduced to forty acres and the trustees of the Milton Academy purchased the house. The Reverend Warren Pierce, Preceptor of Milton Academy, had use of the house and the farm and lived there for sixteen years. The Preceptor of the Academy boarded some of the pupils who lived too far from the school to live at home. After the Academy moved to its present location, the Pitcher homestead was sold and used as a convalescent home, until it was removed about 1900. Descendants of Andrew and Margaret Pitcher will be coming here from all over the United States and we would love to hear that you would be able to attend and celebrate a little history with us on Saturday, October 6, 2007.

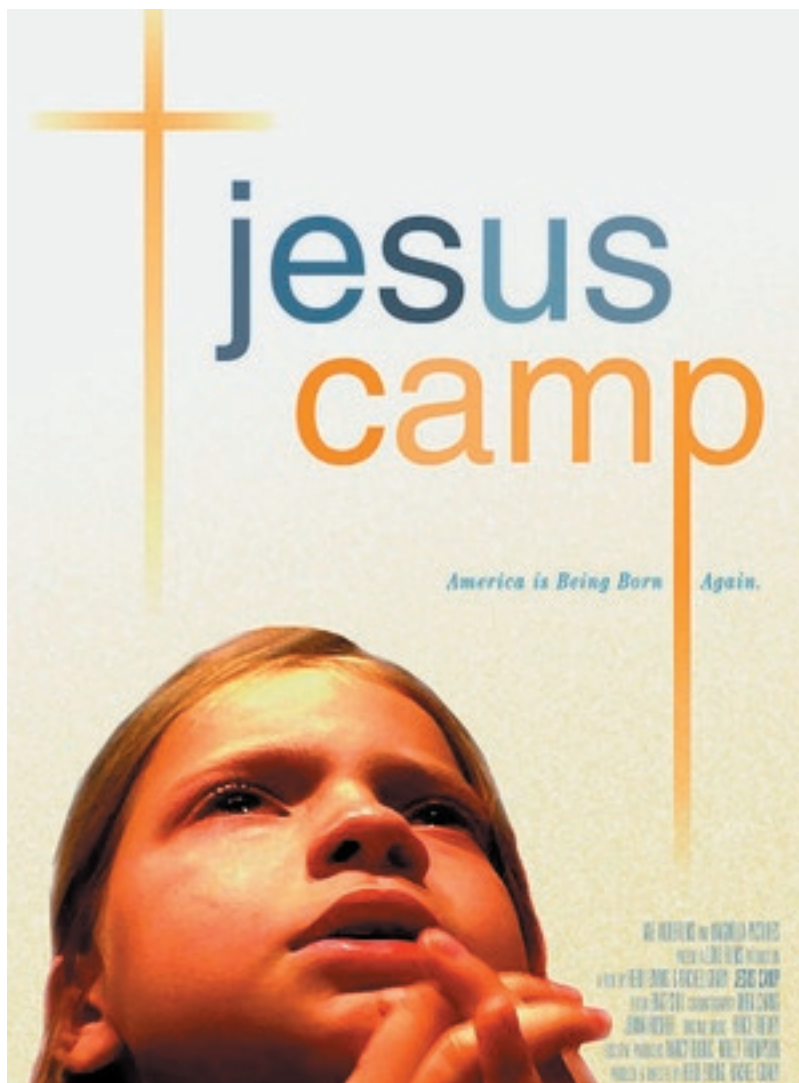

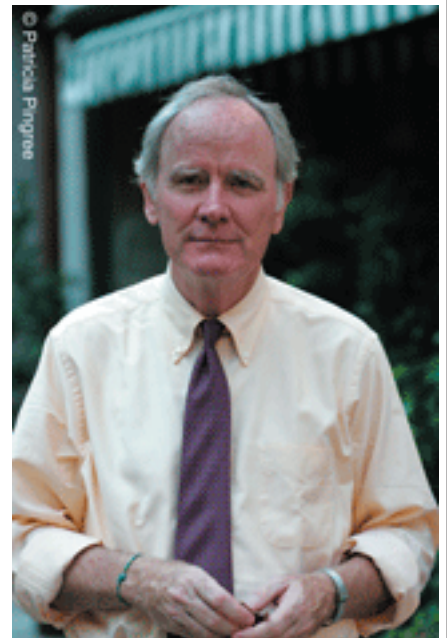
