



Notes on the Parish Committee Retreat

Summer vacation – a time of rest, reflection, rejuvenation. The Parish Committee, our governing board, has taken the summer both to rest from the regular press of church business and to gear up for the new church year.

On Saturday July 28, as the summer work on our own church buildings neared completion, the Parish Committee traveled to historic First Parish in Dorchester for a full-day retreat, to introduce its new members to the secret handshake and set its goals and priorities for the year. While sharing our impressions of what worked well and not-so-well last year, we divided up responsibility for major areas of leadership focus – Financial Stewardship, Growth and Organizational Development – and set goals and timelines for each. Specific goals for Financial Stewardship include raising the remaining \$38,000 needed to complete our immediate building improvement plans by February 1, 2008, and completing the transition to a spring annual budget drive – including the six-month extension of last fall's pledges. The Growth group will focus on methods to more

actively welcome newcomers and effectively integrate them into the flow of First Parish life, with a specific goal of increasing our adult constituency from 305 to 350 during this church year – ambitious but feasible. Under Organizational Development, we will continue efforts to strengthen our use of staff and committees in support of the work of the Parish, with particular emphasis on the Membership and Finance Committees and Adult RE. There will be a comprehensive review of the By-laws. And, we will look more closely at the ways we communicate – internally, with staff and our own members, and externally as we advertise and publicize the things First Parish does in the world and what UU's are all about.

Your Parish Committee is excited about the prospects for the new church year, and looking forward to seeing and hearing from each of you as we share the challenges of moving forward together.

REFLECTIONS FROM THE MINISTER PARISA PARSA

When Our Heart is in a Holy Place



One of the songs in our new songbook has this first verse:

*When we trust the wisdom in each of us,
Ev'ry color ev'ry creed and kind.
And we see our faces in each other's eyes,
Then our heart is in a holy place.*

As I anticipate our return to regular Sunday morning worship, that verse (written by Joyce Poley) plays over in my mind. I can picture those of you who are regular worshipers and look forward to being close enough to see our faces in each other's eyes, and to hear about the places you have found holy in our time apart. I can't wait.

First Parish, in this particular Meetinghouse, has been a sacred space to almost a dozen generations now. Through those years people of all kinds have passed through here, from farmers to prominent speakers and intellectuals (I understand Booker T. Washington once spoke here!) No doubt those folks had all kinds of different shapes and sizes, hopes and hurts, histories and futures. This summer we took the first step to ensuring that all people would be able to join us for worship and fellowship far into the future. We completed the first phase of work to make our buildings more physically accessible.

Church has been a noisy, dusty, place to be this summer, and one of the most delightful kinds of chaos I've ever experienced. At one point, while I was trying to have a phone conversation while there was sawing and hammering outside my office door, it came to me. I realized finally why I was so giddy when under other circumstances I would have been maddeningly annoyed. This is the sound of dreams coming true, I thought. Since long before I had even heard of First Parish

some very dedicated folks have advocated for a building that truly welcomes people regardless of physical ability. Even more people have worked hard to secure funding and draw up plans and compare bids and oversee the work as it progressed. And still more folks – most of you – cheered them on and offered encouragement, kudos and can-do energy. This year we truly open our doors more widely than we have ever been able to before. And this is just the beginning.

The coming year is an invitation to explore how open we can make our doors as we explore the notion of radical hospitality and where it can take our spiritual journeys as individuals and as a community – indeed, how it can transform the world.

From the deepest place in me I say welcome back to us all at First Parish! May we make everything we can of this new year of exploration, consolation, and celebration with this great community.

Do you have a child with a learning difference such as giftedness or dyslexia? Do you have a child with a social, emotional or behavioral issue? Does your child have a mental illness or a physical disability? Would you like to discuss the challenges and rewards of parenting your special needs child with other parents? This support group is for you. This group will be facilitated by three folks from our First Parish community with diverse special expertise in the area of working with children and youth across the needs spectrum.

The Wisdom of Love: Toward a Shared Inner Life

Based on the book of the same name by philosopher Jacob Needleman, this course will be an opportunity for couples to consider how they might support one another in deepening the search for personal meaning. Covering topics including communication, argument, time, "money, work, sex, power, beauty," intentional love and the practice of love, the course offers a space for couples to reflect on ways to strengthen their commitment to one another by exploring their inner lives together. Participants will read and reflect on the different sections of Dr. Needleman's work, and the Rev. Parsa will facilitate discussion and exercises based on the text. During the summer I attended some services of other denominations, and the singing I heard blew me away! Yes, we have new songs we are learning, and we have people in our congregation from different, or no, religious traditions who are learning our UU hymns. Report of UU Musicians' Conference

During the first (hot & humid) week of August, I gathered with 200 other UU musicians at the Clearwater Beach, Florida, UU Church, experiencing seven full days of singing and talking about music and worship. Copyright infringement was a big topic, (just don't copy lyrics or music!) as well as recognizing the "flow" of worship. We also had a great time with Heritage O.P., an exciting percussion group from NYC, who taught us different Caribbean rhythms, and had us dancing to their salsa beat.

The highlight of the conference was preparing and singing "Sources", a UU cantata written especially for the conference, with lyrics by Kendyl Gibbons and music by Jason Shelton. (Look in the front of the grey hymnal, Singing the Living Tradition, for the complete "Sources").

Song-Leading Certification Program Update

As a UUMN Song-Leading Certification candidate, I attended special classes during the conference, beginning my second of three years of this program. I had written a 7-page overview of this past year's music program, described the evolution of the music program since I inherited it from Ned Hastings (tiny choir, very critical, gray-haired congregation, no children's choir, no Hunsaker music), listed the ten times I led in song at FP last year, and created a philosophy of music as ministry at FP. We are being encouraged to see ourselves not just as music directors, but as a religious leader in our churches. Hence the name many UU music directors are assuming: Director of Music Ministry.

The purpose of this Involve workshop is to train teachers to minister to children with special challenges and insure their successful inclusion into the life of our UU congregations. The Involve workshop includes 4 hours of training. This two night training will incorporate teaching strategies, behavioral modification, sensitivity training, hands-on training activities, and discussions concerning pastoral and congregational care.

Serving children with special needs is an immensely complicated process. While our churches are not social service agencies, it is critically important for religious education, pastoral care and social advocates to understand

the complexity and enormous challenges and stress families experience with a special needs child. In order to provide an effective and compassionate ministry, congregations need to understand the complex spiritual, ethical and moral concerns that affect how we as a society treat children and youth with special needs. Involve training will help us build a welcoming ministry for all families that want to attend our churches. Opening our hearts and minds to serving children with special needs strengthens our commitment to the Unitarian Universalist principle of affirming the worth and dignity of every person. Ministering to children with differences helps us not only to be more creative about ministry to all our children, but also helps us as adults to reassess or reaffirm our own beliefs. Lessons of compassion, caring and an acceptance of differences benefit all of us, young and old.

Workshop leader Sally Patton, Ed. M. Developmental Psychology has advocated and worked for children with disabilities for over 35 years. For the past several years, she has written and conducted workshops on ministering to children with special needs in faith communities and on spiritual parenting of children who have been labeled. She also offers private consultations for

parents who are interested in exploring the spiritual questions that arise from parenting a child with a special needs label. Sally is the author of *Welcoming Children with Special Needs, a Guidebook for Faith Communities*. Sally conducts Involve Trainings around the country to train religious educators, ministers, and lay leaders to assist and educate faith communities as to the importance of ministering to children with special challenges.

Sally is the mother of two children, one of whom has special needs.
